



## *Instructions for Authors*

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### Scope

*Crustaceana* (CR) is a leading journal in the world on crustacean research. Including the latest papers from all branches of zoology, it gives up-to-date information on aspects such as taxonomy, zoogeography, ecology, physiology, anatomy, genetics, palaeontology, and biometry, and covers all groups of Crustacea.

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The editorial board tries to keep the reviewing process as short as possible, and to inform the author within two months, although it is not possible to guarantee this.

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### *Length*

Papers should, as a rule, not exceed 40 printed pages in length, or 12000 words, although papers of up to 100 printed pages can be accepted.

## **Manuscript Structure**

Manuscripts should be in their final form. The text should be concise and clear, and contain a minimum of footnotes. Double line spacing and broad margins (2.54 cm all around) have to be



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used throughout, including the title and the list of references, and the (figure) captions. Manuscripts should closely follow the format of the periodical: all those who are not already familiar with the format required for *Crustaceana*, i.e., in particular first-time authors as well as those who have no regular access to the periodical, are strongly advised to request the detailed "Strict Format Rules" for preparing manuscripts, as available from the Managing Editor at: [jcvvk@xs4all.nl](mailto:jcvvk@xs4all.nl).

Papers should preferably be under the responsibility of five authors at most. Systematic papers with more than three authors, if describing new taxa, will invariably be refused.

Authors must refrain from using politically sensitive indications when using geographical names: only internationally accepted terms will be allowed.

### *Abstract*

An abstract (résumé, Zusammenfassung, riassunto, resumen, resumo) of up to 300 words, both in English and in a different language as indicated, has to precede the main text. Translation of titles and abstracts can be provided for by the editors. Notes and News are published without such an abstract.

### *Italics and Bold*

Manuscripts should contain no other indications than those for *italics*, and these should be restricted to (1) scientific names of genera and lower categories; and (2) statistical symbols as well as variables in formulae. Even if these have already been printed in italics (which preferably should not be the case), they are to be singly underlined by the author(s). All other editorial indications are to be left to the editors.

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### *Figures*

All figures must be cited in the text, and the approximate position indicated either in the text file or in pencil in the margin of the main text section of the manuscript.

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Figure captions for all illustrations should be printed together on one or more separate pages and should always mention the name(s) of the species concerned, if relevant.

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Colour plates that are published in full colour only in the online version of the periodical require no charge; however, printing of plates in full colour in the printed version of *Crustaceana* always has to cover the full expense of publication costs, which will be invoiced to the author(s) by the



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References in the text should mention author and date, e.g., 'Recent investigations (Jones, 1969) ...' or 'Jones (1969) remarked ...' and the names of authors cited should not be in capitals (not: JONES). Indications like 'loc. cit.' must be avoided. References in the text should be ordered (1) chronologically [whilst mentioning a certain author only once with all his/her/their publications there cited]; and (2) alphabetically [if from the same year]; such according to international custom.
